Considerations

While each year of high school is impactful, Junior year is a pivotal time in a high schooler's life. This is the time when students are taking a deep dive into their interests and goals for their future beyond high school. Junior year can get quite busy with college visits, ACT or SAT testing, AP classes, extra-curriculars, etc. Please contact the school counselors with any questions or concerns you might have at any point.

Post-High School/College Planning

Junior Year is a great time to engage in job shadows or visit college campuses.

Junior Meetings – Beginning in February, Juniors will meet in small groups with the counselors to learn how to begin post-high school planning. Testing Information

Many colleges have suspended the requirement of the ACT or SAT for the graduating Classes of 2025 and 2026. Check with your college of interest to determine their requirements. Scholarships may still require a test score. We strongly encourage students to take an ACT/SAT at least one time during high school to keep all possible options open.

ACT

General Information: The test is a college entrance exam and is accepted by most post-secondary institutions. The highest scores are taken and may be necessary to complete college applications beyond high school. It is best if testing occurs before a student's senior year. The writing portion of the test is encouraged, but please also check with your possible colleges/universities to see if they require it for admission.

SAT

General Information: Same as ACT above. It tests aptitude for learning and ability in two areas: mathematics and verbal. In addition, a writing test is required. Colleges may also require SAT Subject Tests. Please see your college website for requirements.

AP/ Dual Enrollment Courses

At LCL, all students can take AP and/or Dual Credit courses. With the average student taking over 5 college-level courses, LCL students leave with a firm academic foundation for college.
